Lives lived together and apart: A mother-daughter conversation 15 years later

"Maternal Absence and Family Reconfiguration".

Drawing on story-telling conventions, a mother and daughter engage in an intimate conversation about the effects of divorce, family reconfiguration and maternal absence on a woman, her dependent child and the mother-adult child relationship. This performance reveals how a mother's story becomes the plot line for the daughter's story with both storylines formed, in part, in relation to the reconstitution of the family form. This conversation also challenges the familiar dramatic-traumatic script of divorce and the persistent, if unfounded, assumption that children are negatively affected by maternal absence and non-residential mothering during their formative years.
